First up, must be our Christmas plans, and happily this year we have plenty of them to share, such a joy after last year's disappointments.

CANDLES AT THE READY

Charlotte Hyde, Acting Head of our Primary School, Kimbolton St.James, gives all the details:

"On Thursday 21st October, the children enjoyed a wonderful Harvest Service at school, attended by Canon Andrew Teale from the Diocese. Every class took part in the service with songs and poems performed by the children. We were delighted by the generous donations of non-perishable goods for Leominster Food Bank and by the monetary donations for our link school in Tanzania, where even a small amount of money can help a large number of children to have a nutritious lunch each day."

"We are looking forward to our Christmas celebrations at the end of this term and to finally be able to share them with parents, COVID permitting!" "Classes One and Two will be performing a nativity play to parents in the last week of term. The final church service of our school year will also take place in the last week of term. The children always enjoy making a Christingle and practising Christmas carols for a service where the whole school community will be sharing in a Christingle Service at St. James' Church, one of our favourite services of the year. There will be performances by each class as well as a nativity tableau as the story of the first Christmas is retold by the oldest children in school."

"Christmas also means we will all be going to the pantomime in Hereford, oh yes we will! "This is a lively evening and, together with Orleton, we take over the lower floor of the theatre for a fun filled morning."

"To round off our Christmas celebrations we will be having a whole school Christmas lunch and on the final day a party."

"We can't wait to get started and it all begins with advent. Through our daily worships we are focussing on 'staying alert' as our value of the half term taken from 2 Corinthians Chapter 16 verse 13, 'stand first, stay alert', which is our school vision. CHRISTMAS ROAST IS IN THE BAG

The run up to Christmas can be super stressful, and this year, with the media hyping up the possibility of shortages, some have been anxious.

Luckily for us, we live in an area where good quality, fresh produce is all around, including in Howard Moseley's Leominster shop. He lives in Middleton-on-the Hill and has been a butcher all his life.

"We use the suppliers that we know and trust, in order to receive quality and consistency" he said.

"Our special Christmas Poultry is sourced from The Gibbons Family at Brynblodau Farm, Tregaron in Mid Wales. They have been rearing Free Range Turkeys for the last 30 years and have the most wonderful environment to do so!"

Howard comes from a farming family, and, after training in traditional butchery, first in Stourbridge and then Hereford, he came back home to Leominster and opened his own business in Drapers Lane in 2016.

"Quality and consistency are my top priorities and I get my satisfaction from putting customers first", he said.

Apart from turkeys, Howard has farm geese and ducks from Wigmore and seasonal game when available. Lamb and pork are sourced from A.H. Griffiths Ltd at Leintwardine, beef is from mid Wales and poultry from North Shropshire.

Happily, we welcome Howard (and his wife Pam) this month as advertisers in Roundabout, and next year we'll be bringing you news of more producers in our midst. Every £1 spent locally adds another helping to keep our communities alive.

FROM RAGS TO RUGS – AN ADDICTIVE WAY TO RECYCLE

During lockdown lots of people took up new hobbies and crafts, and the result was the revival of many ancient skills, including rag rug making.

Stuart-Anderson Jenni who lives at the Birches near Leysters, has for many years run workshops in this traditional craft, and she spent her lockdown writing a new book about it, commissioned by the publisher Pen and Sword books, who decided to diversify from military books to crafts.

"Writing this new book was the ideal lockdown project for me," she told us.

"The art of rag rug making goes back to the nineteenth century, when recycling was essential for poor families. Woven cloth was very expensive and so they reused worn clothes in this way to help keep their draughty homes warm".

"They were first placed in front of the fire, then demoted to the kitchen, then the scullery and eventually perhaps the kennel."

"There are loads of different styles and techniques," said Jenni, "some originated in the UK others in the US, but they are all easy to learn and quite addictive!"

Under her expert tuition, enthusiasts have gathered for workshops across Herefordshire Worcestershire and Shropshire, even Belgium. Last month neighbours Wendy Wilson Goddard and Sue Byrne travelled to Leysters Village Hall from Malvern, and soon became engrossed in making their first rag rugs.

Jenni's next workshop will be on 23 February 2022, which is half term week.

Visitors are always very welcome (adm. £4).


The Committee would like to take this opportunity to wish our members a very enjoyable and relaxing Christmas, and lots of good gardening weather in the New Year.

REMEMBRANCE

Remembrance was celebrated in Kimbolton this year, with the church open for the first time since lockdown. Extensive works have been undertaken in this time and we will bring you more on that next time.

Remembrance can be a sombre service, but the history of the fallen, in Middleton-on-the Hill, gives the day a more positive twist.

THE THANKFUL VILLAGE

In the churchyard at St. Mary the Virgin Middleton-on-the Hill stands a lamp that records that this parish was "doubly thankful", in that everyone returned home safely from both the First and Second World Wars.

The term 'Thankful Village' was first used after the First World War referring to fifty-three villages. In the Hereford Diocese there were two others, St. Michael Knill and Harley near Much Wenlock, but peace was shattered with the outbreak of the Second World War and only Middleton remained as a doubly 'Thankful Village', bringing all their soldiers home once more.


This parish is now just one of thirteen villages in England and Wales that can record being doubly 'thankful'. There are none in Scotland or Ireland.

In France such communities are referred to as 'Blessed Villages'.

During the summer of 2013 a 2,500 mile ride to all the English and Welsh villages was undertaken by vintage motorcyclists to raise funds for the British Legion and present each parish with a slate plaque, one of which is now mounted on the wall of the nave.



The inscription on the lamp reads; A THANK OFFERING TO ALMIGHTY GOD "AT EVENING TIME IT SHALL BE LIGHT" FOR THE SAFE RETURN OF ALL THE MEN FROM THIS PARISH WHO FOUGHT IN THE GREAT WAR 1914–1918 AND 1939–1945







ST. DUBRICIUS AND ALL SAINTS' HAMNISH

Among the parishes in Leominster Deanery this little church is truly the 'Christmas' church. Exquisite stained glass fills every window.

"Translucent golden light dances through the glass of the Sub- Kempe windows on the south wall. Telling the story of the Visitation, the Nativity and the flight into Egypt Kempe's work has a unique charm. Colours shine out from jewels that cluster on crowns, the angels play instruments drawn with great delicacy, while their wings are peacock feathers and the donkey carrying the Virgin Mary and Child steps gently over foliage all in a yellow wash which reflects the setting winter sun through the glass."

Charles Kempe was born in 1837. He had a very severe stammer, which sadly prevented him following his vocation to the priesthood. He was later to write; "If I was not permitted to minister in the sanctuary, I would use my talents to adorn it".



"In 1866 he opened his glass studio in London, taking as his trademark the golden garb or wheatsheaf from his family coat of arms. After his death in1907 the studio continued for a short while until 1934 but always superimposed a small black tower above the wheatsheaf to identify the window as a Sub- Kempe. "

"The church historian Arthur Mee wrote, "He gave England some of the most glowing windows in our churches".

POSTSCRIPT

A postscript has just arrived, on that Christmassy little church in Hamnish.

"Arthur William Walker of Hennor House made the initial gift of ± 1000 towards the building of the church.

It took the parishioners a further ten years to raise the rest for the final build.

Arthur Walker died in 1914 and his widow Mary began to complete his vision of installing stained glass in every window in his memory.

The Kempe windows were only part of this project. There are three other studios that were also commissioned for the south nave and the east and west. Eventually the Kempe windows were probably finished in 1924. By then Mary Walker had married again and left Hennor to live in Much Marcle, but she continued to employ talented craftsmen to complete and beautify the church in Arthur's memory."




